## Brain Injury Support Group - Washington D.C. - June 18th

Another parallel was the desire of group members to help each other through their individual and shared ailments, and give advice based on personal experiences.

## Brain Injury Support Group - Madison, WI - June 19th

The topic for the evening's meeting was suicide and suicidal ideation. Group facilitator Dr. Deb Enburg asked a guest speaker, Sarah Porter, Psy.D., to lead a discussion around the topic. Suicide has become increasingly prevalent in the news and it is something that many TBI survivors struggle with. The conversation was intense at times as group members were open and honest about their personal experiences with suicide and suicidal ideation. Outcomes from this meeting included tactics to anchor to life through social supports and personal values.

## Bonsai Retreat - Madison, WI - June 29th

TMR's monthly retreat was at capacity this month as TMR and community members came together for a night of discussion and dumplings. The conversation focused on a recent post from Core member Elaine Cizma that centered on bromances and how they are perceived in different facets of life.
